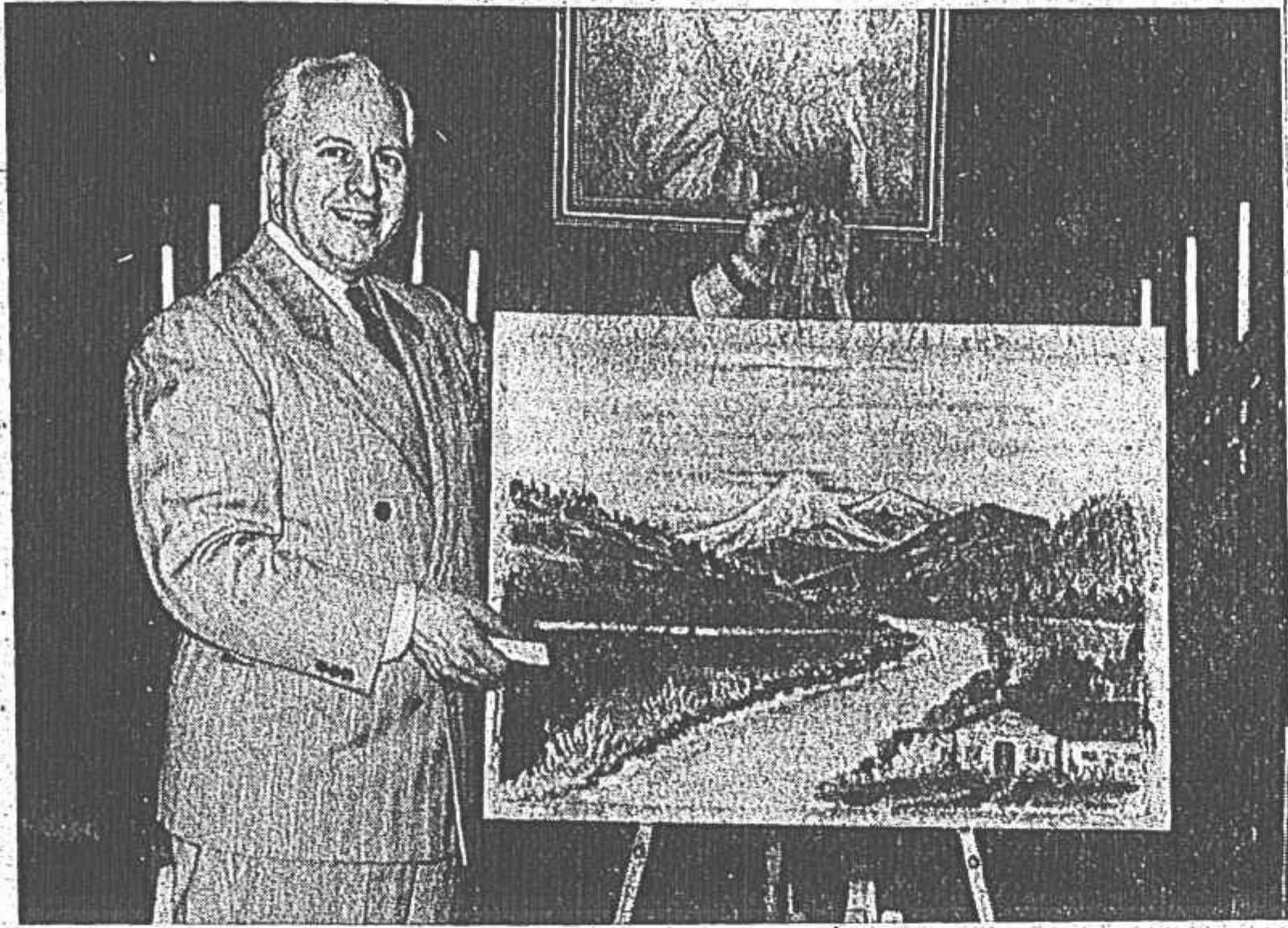


Art Talent Used To Illustrate Sermons

The Green Thumb

ROSE GUIDE: When you buy roses do you purchase "by guess and by golly" or Eeenie-Meenie, Minnie-Mo system? Gardeners expecting to set roses this spring should consult a brand new bulletin entitled, "Guide For Buying Roses," prepared by the American Rose Society.

This helpful guide contains the names, ratings, height, degree of fragrance and color of all of America's common and better-known varieties. We were very happy to note that Paul's Scarlet Climber heads the climber group for the fourth consecutive year. To us, this is one of the greatest climbers of all times. Members of the Society rate the performance of roses as they actually grow.

FREE: Don't guess when it comes to buying roses. This de-

partment has made arrangements to send each reader of this paper a free copy of the rose guide. Just send me a self-addressed, stamped envelope and I'll see that you get your copy. No postal cards, please.

LILAC TIPS: It may be winter but it's still a good time to lick a serious enemy of lilacs—the Oyster Scale. This shows up as a rough, gray encrustation on the stems, branches and limbs of your lilacs. Control: Spray now with a lime-sulfur dormant spray, diluted 1 part to 8 parts of water. Keep the spray away from the painted surface of the house as it will stain. Next month you can also apply a miscible (pronounced "missable," means "mixable") oil just before the buds break out. Use this at strength of 1 to 16 parts of water. Also you can use a summer oil-emulsion spray about the 1st of June, giving another dose a week later. Malathion is effective, 1 teaspoon to a quart of water, and this can be applied about the 1st of June, or earlier.

In early summer you can see active young crawlers on the branches and limbs. That's the best time to hit them, with DDT or Malathion. Usually some of the

young remain protected under the waxy coating of the mother scale, so you'll have to keep after this pest. Some gardeners scrape off heavy infestations with a dull knife and then spray with emulsion.
